

"COACHING THE CANINE ATHLETE" Seminar with Chris Zink, DVM, PhD

NWGA will host a two-day seminar with noted author and lecturer Chris Zink on March 19-20, 2011.

Dr. Zink is a consultant on canine sports medicine and the design of individual training and conditioning programs for competition dogs. She has put more than 70 obedience, agility, retrieving, tracking, and conformation titles on dogs from the sporting, herding, working, terrier, and hound groups. Her books include Peak Performance: Coaching the Canine Athlete; Jumping from A to Z; Smart Trainers: Brilliant Dogs; Dog Health & Nutrition for Dummies; and The Agility Advantage. She has recently released a DVD, Building the Canine Athlete, demonstrating thirty strength, stretching, endurance, and body awareness exercises. In her spare time, she is a professor at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine.

This seminar is for competitors in all dog events and for anyone who wants to know more about keeping their active dog in great condition.

Have You Heard?

Three new dog breeds were announced by the American Kennel Club (AKC) on its website in January, 2011.

The new breeds are the **Entlebucher Mountain Dog**, the **Norwegian Lundehund** and the **Xoloitzcuintli**. *(Ed. – Sorry, no pronunciation guide was provided.)* In 1884 the AKC started by recognizing nine breeds on its list which now grown to 170.

According to Lisa Peterson, the club's spokeswoman, dog breeders, owners and experts must have a breed club of their own which can be used in promoting a canine breed before they apply for recognition with the American Kennel Club. Photos of the three new dog breeds recognized by AKC are available at their website, <u>www.akc.org</u>.

- Entlebucher Mountain Dog is small, tri-colored mountain dog that originated in Entlebuch, Switzerland. They grow up to about 53 centimeters (21") in height and their coats are mostly black with white and yellow to rusty-brown markings.
- Norwegian Lundehund is a loyal, energetic and playful dog breed that grows to about 38 centimeters (15") in height. They have a reddish brown with white markings. It has six toes on each foot and an extra vertebra in its neck that allows it to bend backward and touch its spine with its forehead.
- **Xoloitzcuintli** is an old Mexican breed of dog that is reportedly one of the rarest breeds in the world. This breed of dogs are either hairless or coated that comes in three sizes that include:
 - toy, with less than 35 centimeters high approx. 14"
 - miniature that grew up to about 46 centimeters high, approx. 19.5"
 - standard that grew up to 58 centimeters high, approx. 23".

More AKC Trivia

The Standard Schnauzer has risen just slightly during the last five years or so in the number registered annually with the AKC. At the end of 2010, the S.S. was up a couple of notches to 95th place out of 167 breeds (now 170) just behind our Giant cousins. The Miniature Schnauzer just missed the top ten coming in at 12th place. As we know, such popularity is not necessarily good for the quality of the breed.

By chance, we found a listing of the 50 most popular breeds in the U.S. on Breeders.net. So being curious, we checked out their list. There the Miniature Schnauzer was listed as the 22^{nd} most popular and the S.S. didn't even make the top 50 list. No surprise there, but #50 was. In their research, Breeders.net listed the Biewer as being in 50^{th} place. Again being curious and never even having heard of this breed, we dug a little deeper.

It seems there are perhaps 4 varieties of Biewer all of which are based on teacup Yorkies. None of them are recognized by the AKC and the only entity we found that did recognize the Biewer as a distinct breed is in Germany. Now is the S.S. *really* that obscure to the general public? On one paw, our ego is slightly bruised, but on the other, we are grateful that one cannot buy all the S.S. they want every Sunday out of the want ads.

There exists plenty of opportunity for our Club to promote our breed without getting to the point of 'too much of a good thing'. Being beaten out in popularity by a 'designer' breed isn't so bad because isn't demand being simply driven by popularity? The excellent qualities of the Standard Schnauzer will make it as popular as it should be.

Performance Corner

Have you ever seen a fully decorated full dress military uniform and wondered what all the medals and ribbons meant? We can assure you that the bearer of all that "fruit salad" surely knows and is rightly proud of each and every one. They are not only reminders of one's own accomplishments, but badges of achievement to display for others to admire. For acknowledgement to occur, others must be aware of what has been accomplished to earn the recognition and for them to fully appreciate the difficulty or sacrifice required to earn it.

It is here that we must confess to being more than a little ignorant of the alphabet soup that follows dog's names that perform well and progress in agility. A 'CH' preceding our dog's registered name is easy to grasp and a 'CD', 'CDX', or even at 'UT' following their name is possible to decipher. However, if you are new to modern canine athletic competition, let's look a bit closer at the agility titles and their acronyms.

NA: Novice Agility, an AKC agility title awarded to dogs who earn three qualifying scores from at least two different judges in Novice A and/or B Agility class.

OA: Open Agility, an agility title for dogs who receive three qualifying scores from at least two different judges in Open Agility class.

AX: Agility Excellent, an AKC agility title for dogs who earn three qualifying scores from at least two different judges in Excellent A Agility class.

AXJ: Excellent Jumpers with Weaves, an AKC agility title that requires three qualifying scores from at least two different judges in Excellent A Jumpers with Weaves class.

MX: Master Agility is a suffix agility title for dogs that have earned the Agility Excellent title and have qualified the required number of additional times in the Agility Excellent class at AKC agility trials.

MXJ: Master Jumper with Weaves, an AKC agility title that requires 10 qualifying scores in Excellent B Jumper With Weaves Agility class under two different judges.

MACH: Master Agility Champion, an AKC agility title a dog earns by achieving a minimum of 750 championship points and 20 double qualifying scores obtained from the Excellent B Standard Agility class and the Excellent B Jumpers with Weaves class. The MACH title is often placed before the dog's full name.

As good fortune would have it, our club president submitted the following article on agility titles to expand on the subject.

Jumping Through the Hoops of Agility By Kara Maytag & CH Jordan Baylee of Windtree CD RA MX MXJ

For the past 2.5 years, I have been having a great time competing with my girl Baylee in agility. For those of you that have never been exposed to agility, let me give you a rundown. There are currently 3 classes offered in AKC Agility: Standard (STD), Jumpers with Weaves (JWW) and FAST. All of the classes use a basic set of equipment to set up courses which include jumps, tunnels, chutes, weave poles and the contact obstacles which consist of the dogwalk, a-frame, teeter and table. Jumpers courses only consist of jumps, tunnels and weaves. The standard courses add all of the contact obstacles and the chute into the mix. The FAST class is a relatively new class similar to a standard course, but it incorporates a distance challenge for the dog and handler. (This class is not offered very often here in the MN area.)

Hoops of Agility (cont.)

For each class, there are three levels of competition: Novice, Open and Advanced. As you progress the courses incorporate more obstacles and fewer faults are allowed to earn a qualifying score, which is referred to as a "Q". At the Advanced level, the dog and handler must navigate the course with NO errors and within the standard course time allotted. To earn the basic Novice, Open and Advanced agility titles, three qualifying runs are required. The next level after Advanced is Masters which requires ten qualifying runs.

The ultimate title is the MACH, or Masters Agility Champion. For this, I have to introduce the Double Q. A Double Q is earned when the dog qualifies in both the STD and JWW courses on the same day. In addition to earning the Double Q, points are accumulated equivalent to the number of full seconds under standard course time that the team completes the run. To earn a MACH requires 20 Double Qs and 750 speed points. Multiple MACHs can be earned and are indicated by the number proceeding the MACH title. The individual titles are placed at the end of the dog's name and typically only the highest title earned is listed. The MACH title is placed in front of the dog's name.

So where do Baylee and I stand after 2.5 years? We have had 51 qualifying runs which includes 12 Double Qs and have earned 352 speed points putting us about halfway towards our MACH. She sailed through the Novice and Open classes and we have been working on perfection at the Advanced level with periods of great success and also spans of unfortunate "miscommunications" between the two of us. No matter what, we always have fun on the course! And if you decide to undertake the sport of agility, that is my best piece of advice. Os will come and go, but you and your dog will find the challenges and relationship you build to be the most rewarding part!

To those of you already having fun in agility, I would like to share a software program that is available for free (they ask for a \$10 donation to a rescue organization, and I would suggest SSCA Rescue) to track your progress. It is called Agility Record Book and can be downloaded at http://www.agilityrecordbook.com/. There are also apps available for your iPhone and other mobile devices. Recipe submitted by Kara Maytag-Kaszas

These are Baylee and Harper's most favorite treat for agility! They end up being a great fudgy consistency that is easy to break into pieces. Enjoy!

Tuna Fudge

2 6-oz cans tuna, do not drain. (I have also used salmon, turkey, chicken..use your imagination!) 1 1/2 cups flour (I usually use whole-wheat)

1 T garlic powder or minced garlic

2 eggs

1/4 C grated or shredded parmesan cheese

Process tuna, garlic and eggs in food processor or blender (or mix in a bowl). Add flour and mix to a brownie-like consistency. Spread into a 9x9-inch greased pan. Bake at 350 degrees F for 20 minutes. When the brownies are done, they will have a putty-like texture and the edges will pull away from the sides of the pan.

Cut into squares. They will stay fresh in the refrigerator for 4-5 days. Excellent to freeze in small baggies and thaw as needed.
